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Kita City has positioned the organization of Donald Keene's vast library of approximately 7,000 volumes as a project to commemorate the 100th anniversary of his birth; and to utilize them for research, study, and other purposes. We worked with the Donald Keene Memorial Foundation to organize his rare and beloved books and create a list of his collections. Now, we are pleased to announce the release of the list of books in his collection and the publication of this booklet to promote that list.

This project was promoted by Toyo University, at which Dr. Keene was granted Professor Emeritus status, by Kita City, to which he was an honorary ward resident, and by the Donald Keene Memorial Foundation, to which he was an ambassador; after these three parties signed an agreement in July 2022.

At the end of September 2023, the list of books in the collection was completed and the number of books was finalized at 6425 volumes. Future use of this collection list is anticipated from all quarters. We have created this booklet to coincide with the release of the collection's list, and have included a part of it: an introduction to the main titles and scenes from the project's work, as well as the progress of the project. After the release of the collection's list, we hope that Dr. Keene valuable and beloved books will be put to good use, not only by researchers but also by exhibitions. Therefore, an English version of the booklet was prepared to facilitate its use by overseas researchers and research institutions.

Finally, we would like to express our deepest gratitude to all those involved, for their efforts in promoting the project.

Dr. Donald Keene was an outstanding scholar of Japanese literature and art, widely recognized worldwide. We welcomed him as an academic adviser in 2008 when he was awarded the Order of Culture. And, in 2011, he was awarded an honorary doctorate from Toyo University.

Toyo University established a new campus in Akabanedai, Kita City, Tokyo, which is comprised of three faculties. This connection led to the signing of a tripartite agreement in July 2022, between Kita City, the Donald Keene Memorial Foundation, and Toyo University, which initiated a project to organize and research the approximately 7,000 books in Dr. Keene collection. Although there were restrictions to on-site activities due to the COVID-19 pandemic, more than 100 students expressed an interest in taking part in the project, and 33 of them were selected to participate. The entire project was supervised by Professor Hitoshi Ishida of the Faculty of Letters, specializing in Japanese literature. And, university staff were also involved in supervising the work.

These students accomplished the groundwork for documenting the valuable material -which often contained Dr. Keene beautiful small handwriting - one volume at a time, and transforming it into a living resource. This is a rare opportunity for us, and we believe that we were able to create a project that testifies to the fact that our university - as a research institution - continues to be a center for research based on expertise.

We hope that the results of this project will go beyond being a record of the library collection of a world-class scholar of Japanese literature who lived through the interwar period between the U.S. and Japan and will be used further as soil to create new knowledge that will be passed on for many years to come.

Four and a half years after my father, Donald Keene, passed away in February 2019, the research, organization, and data compilation of the list of approximately 6,500 books that my father had treasured and kept close to him, was completed. • Comments from the Project Supervisor



First of all, I would like to express my sincere gratitude to all those involved in the Donald Keene Collection Organization and Research Project, which was completed and resulted in a list of 6,425 volumes of books in the collection. In particular, I would like to express my deepest gratitude to the people at the regional development division of the Kita City Office who presented the proposal for this joint project to Toyo University, set up the work site and PC environment, and provided solid support until the very end. I would also like to express my deep appreciation to the Donald Keene Memorial Foundation for entrusting students of Toyo University with the task of researching and organizing Dr. Keene's valuable collection of books. And, above all, I would like to express my utmost respect for the steady and tireless efforts of the 33 students who were involved in this project. Without all of your hard work, this project would not have succeeded. Thank you. You were not simply applying for this work as a temporary assignment. You were all interested in Donald Keene, a man who introduced the culture of Japanese literature to the world broadly, and you became involved in this project because you thought you could gain something from the collection of books he left behind. You have followed in the footsteps of Dr. Keane's life through his collection, but what have you learned through them?

I believe there were three significant aspects to this project. First of all, this project became an example of an achievement for the future development of community culture, as a joint project between academia, the public sector, and the private sector. Dr. Donald Keene's legacy of achievement is a "culture" deeply connected to Kita City. In addition to the 787 volumes in the Donald Keene Collection held by the Kita City Central Library, we have now added more than nine times that amount of data to its collection; which strengthens the ties between the two.

Secondly, this research and organizing work was a valuable "education" in itself. The students were impressed by the diversity of Dr. Keane's collection. They were amazed at the vast number of handwritten notes and by-lines left in each book. Moreover, they imagined relationships with Dr. Keene and senders of complimentary copies of books, from the message attached to gifted books. Beyond the books, they should be able to see the human figure of Donald Keene. Students learned of his attachment to the depths of Japanese literary culture, his dedication to lifelong study, and his personality that was adored by all. As a member of the university faculty, I believe that this was a rare educational outcome for students that they could not learn in a classroom. And that was the most significant aspect of this project.

Third, the completed collection list would serve as a basis for future "research" to properly evaluate Dr. Keene's legacy and accomplishments in the academic field. What did "Japanese" and "Japanese culture" mean to Dr. Keene, who loved Japan with all his heart? What were we trying to see in Dr. Keene? I believe that there must be something there that future Japanese must learn in order to realize a multicultural coexistent society.

I believe that this is not the goal of the Donald Keene Collection Organization and Research Project, but rather a new beginning for the community, education, and research.

In organizing the collection, we did not merely compile a bibliographical list, but also meticulously scrutinized the handwritten notes, bylines, autographs, and interleaving on books, page by page, following the example of the collection at the Kita City Central Library. From Keene's handwritten notes in many of books, students could see firsthand that he was a diligent and painstaking reader of Japanese literary culture. I think this wordlessly taught students an academic attitude. In addition, among the books in the collection, many items suggest Keen's extended friendships and the wide range of his hobbies and interests. And, from these, we feel that the very image of Donald Keene is revealed. Here, we introduce a few items from the 6,425 volumes we researched, that provide a glimpse of Donald Keene's true self. The selection is at the sole discretion of myself, as a project supervisor. The numbers in parentheses in front of book titles are the reference numbers of the collection. (Hitoshi Ishida)





On the title page, there is a dedication autograph of Yasunari Kawabata. Kawabata was awarded the Nobel Prize in Literature in 1968, the year before the book was published, and this book was a commemorative publication of the award. It contains Sleeping Beauty, One Arm, and Of Birds and Beasts.










Kindai Nogaku Shu (slip cased)

Yukio Mishima Shinchosha (Tokyo), 1956

The autograph dedication signature from Yukio Mishima is written on the title page, "June 2, Showa 31, the day of your return to Japan." A flyer from the Noh performance of Keene's translation of Hanjo, at the Chuo Koron Building on April 12, 1957, is interleaved in the case. This was probably the first performance of Keene's English translation of Mishima's *Kindai Nohgaku Shu*.

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


Edward G. Seidensticker (Translator) Charles E.Tuttle Company (Tokyo) 1979 / Third Printing


The Problem of Indoctrination As Viewed from Sociological and Philosophical Bases


Michio Nagai Ohio State University (US), 1952

Michio Nagai was a lifelong friend of Keene. He was an educational sociologist who served as an associate professor at Kyoto University, and professor at the Tokyo Institute of Technology, before he became Minister of Education in 1972. This

book is Nagai's doctoral dissertation submitted to the Ohio State University Graduate School in 1952. His autograph is dated August 1966. A letter to Keene is also inserted, in which Nagai praises Keene as "a person whom I adore, and a human."









Joyokanji Santai Shujicho

A reprint of a 1924 edition of a handbook of calligraphy, compiled based on kanji characters limited by the Ministry of Education. There is a handwritten note in Japanese on the top page "From my

navy days, acquired in San Francisco." This book might have been used by Keene to decipher the handwritten cursive characters in the wartime diaries of Japanese soldiers who left their belongings behind. Keene served in the Navy from 1942-45. The handwritten note is believed to be from a later date.






Nihon No Bungaku 20 **Mushanokoji Saneatsu**

Chuokoronsha (Tokyo) 1973 This book is a popular edition of an anthology published from 1964 to 1967. (Ivory Box edition) The editors are Junichiro Tanizaki, Yasunari Kawabata, Sei Ito, Jun Takami, Shohei Ooka, Yukio Mishima, and Donald Keene. Handwritten notes are mostly seen in two of the stories, *Omedetaki*

Hito and Ai to Shi. On the top page, he left handwritten notes, "literature with no lingering effect, extremely non-Japanese, jealous, prominent, denial of intuition, weeping," which makes one wonder how Keene perceived Saneatsu's novels.











Futatsuchocho Kuruwa Nikki

Takeda Izumo, Miyoshi Choraku, Namiki Senryu 1749 / Publisher Unknown

This is a washi-paper Joruri (Gidayu) book bound in a Japanese style. One of the books that Keene kept by his bedside until the time of his passing. It is one of the artifacts most typical of Keene, who loved Noh, kabuki, and yokyoku.




Nihon No Bungaku 37 Riichi Yokomitsu

Chuokoronsha (Tokyo) 1973

This book, the same as 5125, is one of the Ivory Box editions. Many handwritten notes are seen in *Shanghai*. In one part, there is handwriting that translates the novel into English. At the end of *Shanghai*, there is a note: "Aug 6, 1977, Karuizawa." Could be material used for a lecture at Columbia University.

We are pleased to explain how the Donald Keene Collection Organization and Research Project proceeded. The work site was set up in some space in a public facility in Kita City. Books were brought to this site from Dr. Keene study in Nishigahara which was his home, from his Karuizawa villa, and from his library in Niigata. These books were then stored on shelves at the site. At that time, the books from Nishigahara were arranged in such a way as not to disrupt their arrangement, in case the need to recreate Dr. Keene study might appear in the future.

A workplace was secured by arranging desks as shown in the photo. Since this was not a large space, only a maximum of ten people could work simultaneously. The project began in July 2022, during the seventh wave of the COVID-19 pandemic and, in addition, when the number of new cases was the largest since the outbreak. Un-

der such circumstances, we had to be careful to prevent infection.

Each book was examined for bibliographic information, and each page was checked for bylines, handwritten notes, and interleaving. The work required care and patience. The researched information was documented on paper, then the data was entered into PCs provided by Kita City. The maximum number of entries was 72 items per book.

Students worked on the site between classes and on days when they did not have classes. Therefore, not many books could be processed in a day. Since not all participating students had the skills of a librarian (although some were enrolled in classes to obtain librarian certification), we had to ask staff members, or work together, to figure out what we didn't know. We might have looked





as if we were students getting ready for a campus festival.

A total of 33 students participated in this work. The Toyo University Extension Department managed the work shifts. The work took about 13 months, with many students joining the work for a total of more than 100 days.

The work site was also used as a storage area for Donald Keene's collection of books. Many books were taken from here for exhibitions held around Japan to commemorate the 100th anniversary of his birth. Dr. Keene son, Mr. Seiki Keene, often visited the workshop to help select books for exhibitions, and watch over the students' work, and sometimes gave us advice.

This project was a lifetime experience for the participating students. It was an experience that went beyond simply organizing the collection and brought us into contact with Dr. Donald Keene's vast world of knowledge. There was also a sense of accomplishment that came from working with so many people to accomplish a single task.

Donald Keene Collection Organization and Research Project Project Schedule

The project held a call for participating students on campus at Toyo University in June 2022. And, out of 106 applicants, 29 student staff members were selected through a screening process and interviews. On July 14th, Toyo University, Kita City, and the Donald Keene Memorial Foundation signed a joint project agreement, followed by the pre-training for students held at the Kita City Central Library on the 19th and 21st.

Then, on August 1st, 2022, organization and research officially began with the project members consisting of 29 student staff, 2 supervisors, and 1 project supervisor. In addition, a total of four new student staff members joined the project in FY2023: three in April, and one in May. The following is a description of the schedule from the start of the project to its completion.
